

INSPECTION CHECKLIST

When was the last time you looked in every cabinet or inspected your home on your hands and knees? As strange as it may sound, when checking to make sure that medicine is out of the reach of children, it's crucial to go over your house with a fine-tooth comb — even getting down on the floor to see things from a child's perspective.

TO GUIDE YOUR SAFETY INSPECTION, CHECK OFF THE FOLLOWING ITEMS AS YOU EXAMINE EACH ROOM.

KITCHEN

- UPPER CABINET**
Make sure that medicine being stored in an upper cabinet, like the one over the refrigerator, is it locked at all times.
- GARBAGE CAN**
Refrain from throwing medicine into the garbage. Instead, check with your pharmacist for a local collection program.
- KITCHEN COUNTER**
Check to see if any vitamins, pain relievers or other medicines have been left out.
- REFRIGERATOR**
If any medicines are stored in here, be sure to secure the refrigerator with a child safety lock.
- THE FLOOR**
Check to see if any pills have accidentally fallen on the floor.

BATHROOM

- MEDICINE CABINET**
If medicine is stored here, make sure it's locked at all times.
- ON TOP OF SINK**
Check to see if any vitamins, pain relievers or other medicines been left out.
- CABINET UNDER SINK**
If medicine has been stored here, make sure it's locked at all times.

BEDROOM

- NIGHTSTAND**
Check to see if a family member, or an overnight guest, left vitamins or medicine here.
- DRESSER**
Remove any vitamins, pain relievers or other medicines that have been left out or stored in an unlocked drawer.
- FLOOR**
Check to see if any pills have accidentally fallen on the floor.
- UNDER BED**
Check to see if any medicine has accidentally fallen under the bed where a child could get to it.
- CLOSET**
If medicine has been stored in a closet, make sure it's locked at all times.
- PURSE/BAGS**
Be careful of leaving purses, diaper bags or guest bags, that may contain medicine, where a child could get into them.
